## Introduction

- In Greece crime prevention is the responsibility of the Ministry of Public Order, Civil Defence and Public Protection.
- Athens has a population of 5 million including 1.5 million immigrants.
- Expects to have 4.5 million visitors during the Olympic Games and is hosting the Para Olympic Games.
- Number one priority for Greece and all main countries is the security of the Games.
- The highway from Fario to the centre of Athens was constructed within 15 days
- 7 subways originally had no lighting – they suffered from graffiti, flyposting, illegal traders, buying and selling drugs, homeless people – they were dangerous places
- Unable to have a pedestrian bridge due to electrical wires overhead
- Pedestrian subway featured was used by motorcyclists; danger of explosives being planted and it became a no go area for pedestrians

Graffiti is a problem – most is political

Walls cleaned as soon as possible by shop owners or the City.  
No anti-graffiti glaze recommended or used as yet

- Existing empty shop premises are now let by offering low rents
- Shop owners use guards and police protection
- CCTV and silent alarm system have been installed
- The area is flooded with light
- Use of mirrors is the next step
- In daytime some problems have been alleviated
- People's feelings of fear of crime have been greatly reduced.

At night:

- Monitored by police and guards
- Problems reduced but not eliminated – it is within an entertainment centre with prostitution problems
- Some displacement – drug dealers now in university, night clubs, bouzouki as drug users have been discouraged from using subways.
